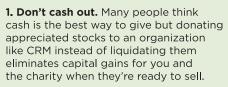

So, homelessness is not just about a lack of a dwelling, and addiction is not just about saying, "no." It's much more. Our hope is that when someone leaves our care, they are successful, sustainable, productive members of society that are connected with other believers and God so they may stay the course.

SUMMER'S STORY: THE TIME TO CHANGE

Summer recovered quickly from the back surgery she required as a teenager. But when the procedure was repeated in her late 20s, the experience was much more challenging. She was older. She was a mother. And she held a full-time job. "I had to keep going," she says.



Summer began to abuse the medication she'd been prescribed to ease her pain. "I would take two instead of one when my back was really killing me." But instead of helping her maintain control, the misguided practice only led to addiction – and a heart-wrenching cycle of abusive relationships, unhealthy behaviors, incarceration and self-loathing.

"I WAS LOST - EMOTIONALLY... SPIRITUALLY... PHYSICALLY."

Her self-destructive lifestyle continued for several years. Then she hit rock bottom. She suffered a stroke, blood clots and a staph infection that left her in a coma and near death. "When I woke up, I literally couldn't remember the last three years of my life!" The traumatic experience finally led her to seek help. "I needed to be where I could find myself again. And that's what City Rescue Mission did for me."

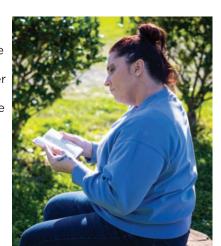
Once in CRM care – broken and weary – she slept... she listened... and she tried to comprehend what was going on around her. "I was surprised by everybody's love," she says, "because I'd never experienced that before." In our faith-based environment, through Bible study and Christian fellowship, her heart was also reopened to God's love.

"Until I was 18, I did everything in church," she says. "But then I got so lost in the maze I called my life that I really didn't understand who God was. I didn't understand it was Him alone I needed. But when I did, I cried."

Through our LifeBuilders Program, grounded in her new-found faith, she's preparing for her future through life-skills development, education and work readiness. In her role as the Mission receptionist, she enjoys greeting guests, making them feel comfortable and directing them to the appropriate staff. We're also ensuring she receives the medical care she needs to grow stronger physically as well as spiritually "The Mission has set me up to succeed. They've truly guided me. They've helped me overcome so much."

She hopes to return to school to earn a teaching degree in history, because she loves to help others learn. "I don't know why... I don't know how... but God has a plan for me!"

Through your heartfelt prayers and support, Summer is healing from the inside out and, most importantly, discovering her identity as a child of God. "The Mission helped me see myself as a bright person and a beloved person. I'm so thankful because they helped me find me."

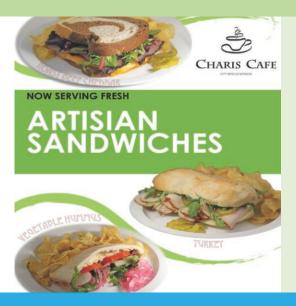
