In many ways, there is a war on truth in today's culture. We are in an age of expressive individualism.

The Wall Street Journal, the Pew Research Center, the RAND Research Institute, Impact 360 Institute, and Barna Institute have all studied truth in today's culture. RAND uses the term "truth decay" to describe a society pulling apart over basic facts and opinions as the overriding factor. They define "truth decay" as "the diminishing role of facts." This leads to general uncertainty around what's true and what isn't. Impact 360 Institute noted that "the survey results and trajectory were deeply concerning. It means moral reality, moral truth, shifts as society shifts."

The Barna Research Group studies showed that less than one out of three born-again Christians adopt the notion of absolute moral truth. In another study, people were asked if they believed that moral absolutes exist and are unchanging or that moral truth is relative to the circumstances. By a 3-to-1 margin adults said truth is always relative to the person and their situation.

The term "post-truth" is often used to describe the current climate in the United States. Reality has become relative, and facts are open to interpretation due to the influence of opinion over facts and declining trust in what was considered a source of factual information. This can lead to alienation and disengagement.

We have gone from a religious world view to a secular work view. "The attempt at self-creation doesn't lead to deification it leads to dehumanization." (Russell Moore, Christianity Today).

As Christians, we need to go back to the basics for truth- the Bible (John 17:17). Because God cannot lie (Titus 1:2). Jesus Christ, as God, is the personification of truth (John 14:6; Ephesians 4:21). Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

There is so much confusion! We share The Truth- God's Word, Jesus the Messiah, every day with those who come to us for help because when we know the truth, "the truth will set us free." (John 8:32).

RRUCE'S STORY

I LEARNED I CAN JUST BE ME

Bruce and his four siblings were raised by a single mom who struggled to provide for their needs. Sometimes, they went hungry. Often, they wore clothing they'd long ago outgrown. Always, it seemed, they lived in fear of losing their home.

As Bruce grew older, he came to recognize the challenges his mother faced and took it

upon himself to help. But with little education and no marketable skills, his options for earning money were limited. "So I was always doing criminal activities," he says. "And when I wasn't doing that, I was locked up." Over the years, he was incarcerated four times.

Because of this destructive cycle, Bruce never developed a sense of self-esteem or relationships that gave his life meaning. He grew increasingly depressed. His hope for the future waned. He began using drugs to ease his deep despair.

He spiraled farther and farther downhill until finally he found himself homeless.

As he reached rock bottom, he realized nothing he could do on his own would heal his depression, restore his hope, and reset his course for the future.



to turn. Bruce checked himself into a mental health facility... and they referred him to City Rescue Mission. He recalls the sense of relief he felt when he first walked through our doors.

"It was like a load had been lifted up off of me and they accepted me for who I am. In the past, I would try to fit in, but here I could just be me. I could just be Bruce."
