# Paul's Ponderings

To be "elect of God" means to be lovingly chosen by Him. The word "elect" reminds us that God, in His wisdom, calls us into a relationship of grace and mercy. Scripture affirms this truth (John 6:44; Romans 8:28-30; Ephesians 1:4-5). The mystery lies not in whether God chooses, but in how His love reaches us.

In everyday terms, elections involve people choosing leaders. In the Bible, however, "elect" speaks of God Himself choosing His people. The Greek word eklektos (meaning chosen, or elect), used throughout the New Testament, points us to the heart of God, His desire to gather us into His family Executive Director and give our lives purpose.



Ephesians 1:5 tells us that God "predestined us to be adopted as his sons through Jesus Christ, in accordance with his pleasure and will." Our place in His family is not earned but given, flowing from His eternal love (Malachi 3:6; Romans 8:29). Though God desires all to be saved (1 Timothy 2:4; 2 Peter 3:9), He honors the freedom of our response. Salvation is offered to all, and creation itself testifies of His presence (Romans 1:19-20).

The Bible holds both truths together: God's sovereignty and our responsibility. He foreknows, yet He also invites. As Creator, He holds these realities in perfect balance.

To be among God's elect is not about privilege but about purpose. Chosen people reflect His character, showing compassion, extending mercy, and declaring His goodness. God is impartial and unchanging. His love embraces all, although not all return that love.

The call of the elect is simple yet profound: love deeply, serve humbly, and live so others glimpse God's goodness. The question remains: how will we respond? I hope that we follow this lead as we reach out to those in need. At City Rescue Mission, the Bible-based curriculum and Christian culture help men and women discover the joy of being chosen by God. ## **JAY'S STORY**

#### I WANTED SOMETHING DIFFERENT FOR MY LIFE

Raised by his grandmother in a tight-knit neighborhood, Jay had plenty of love and attention. But without the presence of a father figure, he strayed into dangerous territory. As he reached his midtwenties, he'd survived substance abuse, prison and even a shooting. But what truly shook him wasn't a jail cell or a bullet - it was losing the one place he thought he could always go: his family's home. That's when Jay hit rock bottom... and a new life brought him hope.

Jay grew up on Jacksonville's West Side. His father was incarcerated, and his young mother struggled with her responsibilities. His grandma stepped in to care for him. Now surrounded by an extended family of cousins, uncles and aunties, Jay became immersed in community traditions

"My son's watching everything I do now," Jay says. "And I want to be the kind of father I never had. I'm doing this for God, for my son... and for me."

like church. cookouts, and football.

Despite the family environment, he had few boundaries. "There

was a lot of love - but not a lot of supervision," he recalls. At age 15, without proper structure and guidance, he drifted into the wrong

When a cousin he looked up to was killed, Jay was devastated. He hardened his heart and numbed his pain however he could. "It started with parties," he says. Then he adopted the habits of those around him, including substance abuse and criminal activities.

While still a teenager, Jay found himself facing charges. Although he didn't serve time, he didn't heed the warning. He continued down a

dangerous path that finally led to prison. Released four years later, he was ready for a new beginning. But old patterns were hard to break. "The neighborhood, the habits, the friends - they pulled me back in."

Even when a bullet nearly ended his life, he still wasn't done. But his family was. In an act of tough love, they no longer welcomed him in their homes, hoping it would be the wake-up call he needed. Shunned by those who had always been there for him, he knew he had reached rock



Then his son was born, and that changed everything. "I realized it wasn't just about me anymore." Jay prayed for help to turn his life around and felt God guiding him to the Mission.

Jay was cautious at first. After all he had been through - violence, danger, survival - trust didn't come easily. "But they didn't give up on me. The Mission gave me a chance to sit down, detox and get my mind right."

In our Christ-centered LifeBuilders Program, Jay found structure, support and a new sense

of purpose. Through Bible study, education, life-skills development and work readiness, we guide individuals like Jay to become self-sufficient and productive members of their communities. As he strengthened his walk with God, the anger and defensiveness he once used as protection gave way to patience, humility and faith. "They helped me learn to forgive, to take accountability, to grow."

When he leaves our care, Jay has plans to attend college and study computer technology. He also wants to develop a Christian-based YouTube channel to encourage others facing hard times, like he once did. And he hopes to return to the prison system - not as an inmate, but as a mentor, sharing his testimony with those preparing for life after incarceration. "I want to reach people - young people, homeless people, anyone struggling – and let them know: you can make it."
